

KENDALL HELLMAN ARNEY QUEEN OF CARNIVAL

Her Majesty, Queen Kendall Hellman Arney is the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Damon Starr Arney and the granddaughter of Mr. and Mrs. Rudi E. Scheidt. She served as the Racquet Club Princess in the 2003 Royal Court of Carnival Memphis.

Queen Kendall's family has been very involved in Carnival Memphis, since the beginning of the celebration of Carnival. The Mystic Society of Memphis, Carnival's oldest Krewe has been the greatest beneficiary of the family royal lineage. Queen Kendall's Great-Grandmother, Dorothy Hohenberg, was a Memphis Duchess in 1938, the fourth year of the organization's existence. Her Grandmother, Honey (Helen) Scheidt represented Memphis as Duchess in 1972 and Queen in 1988.

Rudi E. Scheidt, the Queen's Grandfather, served as Memphis Ouro in 1977. Her Mother, Susan Scheidt Arney served the Memphis as the 61st Queen in 2001. When Queen Kendall was presented in the Carnival Memphis Royal Court in 2003, she kept a family tradition that was started by her Grandmother in 1949 and continued by her mother in 1973, and her Aunt, Helen Gronauer in 1988.

The Queen has just completed her third year at the University of Virginia where she is studying Government. Kendall is an active member of the Pi Beta Phi Fraternity where she served as pledge class President and was recently voted "Most likely to become the first female President of the United States of America." Kendall spends much of her time working at Madison House, a volunteer organization run by UVA students. She was recently named Program Director and is responsible for coordinating publicity efforts for a 24 hour crisis intervention hotline. She is also a student docent at the University of Virginia Art Museum and has worked with at risk children from the community of Charlottesville through the Museum's Early Visions program.

Kendall's commitment to community service began long before she entered The University as a student. In high school

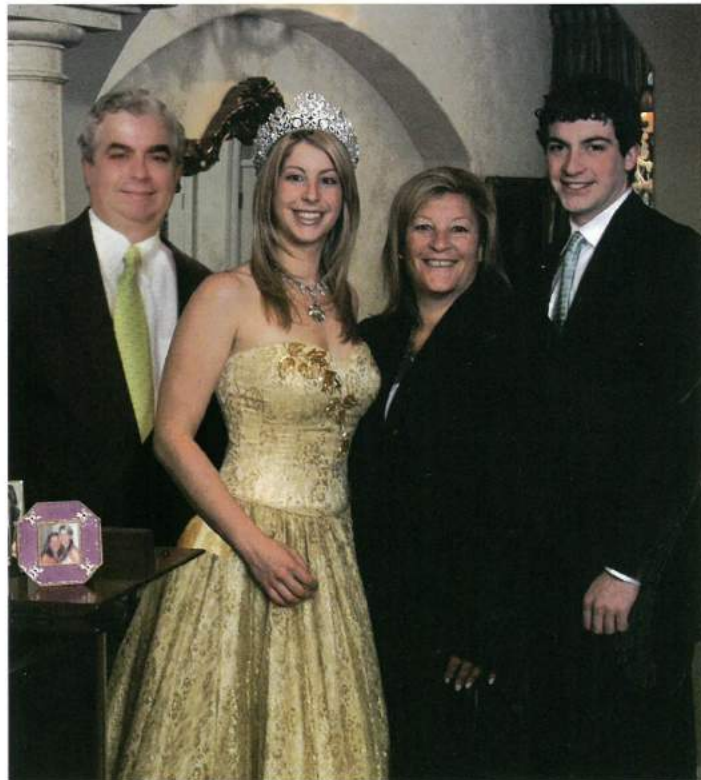
Kendall volunteered her time to help children with Down Syndrome and Cerebral Palsy as a counselor at Camp Live-it-Up. She also participated in Bridge Builders.

Queen Kendall graduated from White Station High School where she served as President of the student body, President and Vice President of Business Professionals of America, and was a member of both Beta Club and National Honor Society. Throughout her years at White Station she also held the Student Council positions of Sophomore Commissioner of Activities and Historian. Kendall was also a member of the Yearbook staff and acted as the editor of the Student Life section of the 2002 publication. With all of her leadership

responsibilities it is obvious that Kendall is dedicated to serving others, and it is no surprise that her greatest passion in life is politics. Kendall was an active participant in the Youth Legislature program where she held the positions of Senator, Commissioner of Tourism, and Commissioner of Corrections. She was also selected to attend Tennessee Governor's School for International Studies. Her Majesty worked in the Nation's Capitol for Senator Lamar Alexander. She also served as a Page for the 2004 Republican National Convention. When she graduates next year from college, Kendall hopes to pursue both a Law School education and a Masters Degree in Political Management.

When questioned about her role as Queen, Kendall said, "It is such a great honor to serve the Memphis community and to represent the aviation industry as the 2005 Queen of Carnival.

The three charities we are supporting this year are truly exceptional. I know that my experiences with Food Bank Kid's Café, Martha's Manor, and SMART will leave me forever changed and will eternally ignite my passion of serving others. It is my greatest hope that the Memphis community will share in my sentiments and perhaps be able to say in the future that I had the same affect on them throughout my reign."
