

# Message from the President

The history and tradition of Carnival is our greatest asset. Carnival was established in 1931 to promote the cotton industry and publicize the vitality of the Memphis area. Carnival festivities including our royalty, parade, pageants, formal balls and amusements became known as

"the party with a purpose."

The goal of Carnival '87 is to renew that original purpose by promoting industries that have a major impact on the Memphis economy. Since Carnival began, Memphis has grown to become a city with a diverse economic base. Cotton remains an important industry to our community, but there are other industries that contribute significantly to our local economy.

Each year Carnival will honor a different industry that supports the local economy. This year we are proud to salute the Agribusiness industry. We feel it appropriate that Agribusiness has been selected as our first honored industry because of our historic ties to cotton.

The first annual Business and Industry Awards Banquet will be held at Agricenter International to recognize individuals and companies who have made significant contributions to Agribusiness. Carnival has also developed an educational program highlighting the history of Carnival and the importance of Agribusiness for use in the Memphis and Shelby County School systems.

The King and Queen of Carnival symbolize the importance of our saluted industry. They will promote the industry and its contributions to the Mid-South during their reign. An audio-visual presentation on agribusiness will be used by the King and Queen on their visits to

business and civic groups.

The mystique surrounding the secret selection and identity of the King and Queen prior to the Crown and Sceptre Coronation is a long standing tradition. With that tradition in mind, the Grand Parade featured the King and Queen in mask to conceal their identity. Other parade participants were encouraged to wear costumes and masks. The 1987 Parade was a salute to the Ramesses The Great Exhibition in honor of a historic event in our city. Carnival has revived one of its oldest traditions following the parade, a festive Masquerade Party!

Carnival will bring back the most popular event in its history, the Royal Presentation Barge. The backdrop of the Royal Barge is an elaborate Egyptian Pavillion flanked by custom-built theme floats honoring Ramesses The Great.

This spectacular event marks the public arrival of the King and Queen in truly royal fashion.

The Association will sponsor many public events that offer something for everyone, 'Karnival for Kids' on Mud Island is a new event which has been added this year. 'The Stone Soul Weekend' is a cultural event featuring a beauty pageant, music, and cooking contest. The Carnival Musicfest '87 will highlight the valuable resources of Memphis musical talent in a ten-day event at the Fairgrounds.

Carnival is as strong as the spirit of the people who support it. Membership is up in the Association as well as our Grand Krewes. The enthusiasm of the staff and hundreds of volunteers who donate their time has been unsurpassed. The generosity of financial contributions and sponsorships has been outstanding. The future of Carnival is positive and confident. Carnival is indeed a "party with a purpose" that is here to stay.

Carnival's 1987 Queen is a graduate of St. Mary's Episcopal School and participated in the Memphis University School's England Program and the Rotary Exchange Program in Germany.

An avid outdoor enthusiast, Queen Margaret enjoys rock climbing, backpacking, tennis and on the more relaxing side—she enjoys cooking. After Carnival, our Queen plans to be a leader on Wilderness Ventures, a backpacking, rafting, rock climbing adventure for teens. She is hoping to lead a six week trip in the Pacific Northwest or Alaska. Last year, with Wilderness Ventures, she participated in a technical ascent of the Grand Teton and rafting on the Salmon River in Idaho. Queen Margaret has had individual instruction in technical rock climbing in Pike's Peak National Park and has participated in the National Outdoor Leadership School, a 32 day mountaineering course in Wind River Mountains, Wyoming.

Excited about her role, Queen Margaret said, "Carnival is one of the oldest traditions in the Mid-South and I am very honored to have been selected to serve as Queen. The Carnival Association has a remarkable history of contribution to the city and this year's salute to one of our areas most important industries, Agribusiness, represents the continuing efforts of the Association to promote and publicize the assets of our great city."

Queen Margaret is the daughter of William Carrington Jones and Peggy James Jones. Her father is the owner of Carrington Jones Company, a real estate firm active in the Memphis market for over 50 years. Her brother, Mason, a Scarab, will graduate from Memphis University School this spring. # King Jim of the House of Barton

A descendant of Carnival royalty, King Jim is the 53rd King of Carnival following a family tradition established by his father, the late Frank G. Barton, the 4th King of Carnival and his brother Frank G. Barton, Jr., the 41st King. The King's wife, the former Carol Lee Piplar, served as princess to the President in 1963 and her father, Charles L. Piplar was President of the Association in 1962. Children of the royal family are James H. Barton, Jr., a sophomore at Dartmouth, and two daughters, Coleman, a junior at Hutchison, and Hardin, a seventh grader, also at Hutchison.

Our emissary from the agribusiness industry, King Jim realizes the importance of the Business and Industry Salute. "Carnival's salute to Agribusiness showcases the contributions of our industry to the Mid-South community," said King Jim. "It is an honor for me to serve as ambassador and spokesman for our industry, the largest industry in the region accounting for at least 25% of the areas Gross Domestic Product." The King's involvement in agribusiness includes farming, farm implement distribution and retail farm equipment sales.

King Jim received his degree in economics at the University of North Carolina, where he was a Morehead Scholarship recipient. He continued his education at Vanderbilt University where he received his law degree.

Active in the community, King Jim serves on the Board of Directors of the Morgan-Keegan Southern Capital Mutual Fund and Trezevant Manor. He is a member of the Board of Trustees of Memphis University School and The Hutchison School.

The King's life long involvement in Agribusiness and Carnival have prepared him well for his role as ambassador to the industry and spokesman for Carnival. "It is most appropriate that Agribusiness

was chosen as the first industry to be honored by the Association, because of the significant impact that our industry has on the economy," the King commented. "The commitment of Carnival to refocus on the original purpose of the organization is a positive and significant step forward. Carnival is truly, A Party with a Purpose."

King Jim's leisure time is usually centered around family activities. He admits to being a "less than championship caliber" tennis player and enjoys golf and an occasional game of handball.



The most exciting addition to Carnival '87 is the Business and Industry Salute. This program is a revitalization of Carnival's original purpose...the recognition and promotion of an industry that has a major economic impact on the City of Memphis.

Agribusiness, a logical choice because of our historical ties with cotton, has been selected as the first industry to be saluted by Carnival.

Union Planters National Bank and the Memphis Business Journal are co-sponsors of the event. An awards competition has been developed to honor companies and individuals that have made significant contributions to the industry. Winners, chosen by a distinguished panel of judges, will be announced at the first annual Business and Industry Awards Banquet at Agricenter International on June 4, 1987.

We have developed a lesson guide designed to teach students the importance and significance of our selected industry. The lesson plan includes a 28 page work/play book for students and is now in the Memphis City Schools and Shelby County Schools.

The Business and Industry Salute provides several appealing benefits to Carnival and the city, including:

- 1) A viable purpose for the Mid-South's oldest tradition Carnival;
- A vehicle through which groups and associations related to our saluted industry are encouraged to hold meetings and conventions in Memphis during our annual celebration;
- Development of trade shows, industry seminars and forums during Carnival week that attract tourist to our city and further promote the saluted industry;
- 4) A basis for Carnival and city officials to encourage businesses, within the industry we are honoring, to expand existing operations and solicit new businesses to locate in our city.



### 1987 Maid of Cotton — Amy Gough

**Personal Background:** Amy is the 19-year-old daughter of Dr. and Mrs. David Gough of El Paso, Texas. She is 5'6" tall, has green eyes and blond hair.

A sophomore at University of Texas in Austin, Amy is majoring in English and biology and has a 3.8 grade point average on 4.0 system. She is a Dean's honor roll student, a Member of Kappa Alpha Theta sorority, Phi Eta Sigma academic society, and Alpha Lambda Delta academic society.

The 1987 Maid of Cotton is a graduate of Coronado High School in El Paso. Amy was president of the Student Council and a member of the National Honor Society. She was nominated by the Mayor as Outstanding Student of El Paso for the U.S. Secretary of Education's International Youth Year Award in 1985 and was the El Paso Herald-Post's "Student of the Week."

Maid of Cotton Selection: Amy was chosen by judges as U.S. cotton's goodwill ambassador from a field of 17 finalists from 9 cotton producing states at the 49th annual selection December 30, in Dallas. The Panel of five judges was headed by Mrs. Trenton Shelton, 1961 Maid of Cotton. Finalists were judged on basis of personality, poise, communications skills, and appearance during three days of selection activities. Amy will receive a \$10,000 educational award made possible by grant to The Cotton Foundation from Ciba-Geigy Corporation. The Maid of Cotton selection and tour are managed by The National Cotton Council, the central organization of the U.S. cotton industry with headquarters in Memphis, Tennessee.

Maid of Cotton Activities: Amy's first official appearance in her six-month tour was at Cotton Bowl festivities in Dallas on New Year's Day. Her domestic tour, pointing up the cotton industry's importance to nation, will be highlighted by a visit to Washington, D.C., and an appearance at Carniva's Maid of Cotton Fashion Show and Luncheon on June 3. Her international tour will take her to the Far East for cotton fashion appearances, visits with government dignitaries and textile executives, and retail store promotions. In Europe, Amy will be honored guest at the U.S. cotton seminar in Monte Carlo where she'll meet with spinner representatives from Italy, Spain, Portugal, West Germany, Switzerland, France, Belgium, and the United Kingdom.
